MATSUDA Gonroku's tools

Left showcase

1 : Kujira bera (whale spatula)

2 : Brush modeled after one from the Heian period (794-1192) discovered during the repair of Chuson-ji Temple's Golden Hall

3 : Spatula made of cypress bark

4 : Brushes used only for final coating

5: Brushes used only for undercoating

6: Brushes for fine application

7 : Small brushes

8 : Ashirai kebo (treatment brush)

9 : Tortoiseshell spatula for washing *maki-e* brushes

10 : Brushes for "hikkaki" (scratching) made of wire of different sizes

11 : Bunmawashi (compass)

12 : Kenki (dog's fang)

13: Taiki (sea bream tooth)

14: Various maki-e fude (decoration brushes)

15: Fun-zutsu (powder pipe)

16: Knives used to shave a spatula or scrape off dry lacquer, called a lacquerer's knife (*nushi-gatana*)

17: Yari-kanna (spear plane)

18: Chisels and cutting knives

20: Wristwatch

21: Writing utensils

22: Glasses

23 : Fun-chin

(a paperweight for holding folded-paper packages of *maki-*e gold and silver powder)

24: Fun-saji (a small spoon for maki-e gold and silver powder)

25: Fun-zutsu (powder pipe) made of bird quill (see also Exhibit No. 15)

26 : Tume-ban

a small pallet for lacquer when working on *maki-e*)

27: Ashirai kebo (treatment brush)

28: Harai kebo (a brush used to remove dust)
