I suggested we call it 'The Archives of American Art'."








1970s Expansion of Regional Network of Research and Collecting Centers



1980s Standards for Archival Description: USMARC Format and Content Standards





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
1985 Smithsonian Institution Bibliographic Information System

- Supported USMARC formats for libraries, archives and museum and research center databases
- Sparked collaboration; use of standards; development of shared vocabularies and authority files
- Provided collection management capabilities
- System support, maintenance and migration handled by central Smithsonian

1999 –2004 Large-scale Digitization of Microfilm Sets the Stage

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- Digitized 267 microfilm reels 250,000 files
- Developed the future strategy for digitization of original collections in their entirety
- Used EAD XML's structured data corresponding to image file directory and naming conventions to link the digital files
- Presented the digital files online via box/folder links.

2005-2018 Terra Foundation for American Art Digitization Grant



In 2005, the Archives of American Art and the Terra Foundation for American Art set out to create an unparalled virtual repository for the study of the visual arts of the United States. As one of the Terra Foundation's first grant recipients, the Archives received a multi-million dollar award to support the establishment of a digitization program that would result in online, free access to a substantial cross-section of the Archives' most significant collections. Such a program is in keeping with the foundation's priority of making research resources on American art available to people around the globe. These funds enabled Archives staff to develop an innovative, archival approach to large-scale digitization, to design and program a technical infrastructure and public web interface, to arrange and process collections, and to manage the resulting digital repository that comprised over 1.5 million digital files by the end of the grant's five-year period.

In spring 2011, the Terra Foundation awarded a second multi-million dollar grant to the Archives to support another five years of the digitization project and a new position, the Terra Foundation Project Manager for Online Scholarly and Educational
